

Madrid Plan of Action - 2002

- Article 2
- We celebrate rising life expectancy in many regions of the world as one of humanity's major achievements.
- We recognize that the world is experiencing an unprecedented demographic transformation and that by 2050 the number of persons aged 60 years and over will increase from 600 million to almost 2 billion and that the proportion of persons aged 60 years and over is expected to double from 10 to 21 per cent.
- The increase will be greatest and most rapid in developing countries where the older population is expected to quadruple during the next 50 years.
- This demographic transformation challenges all our societies to promote increased opportunities, in particular opportunities for older persons to realize their potential to participate fully in all aspects of life.



Approach

- Its has been perceived since ages that age old beliefs have created such traditions which stand nullified in the current age
- The corruption of ideologies need to be rectified and the value of human being in young and old age respected
- Viewing it from cultural perspective simplifies recreating the current human rights understanding




Mahatma Gandhi

- To build sustainable support system for protection of Human Rights of Older Persons at international as well as national levels


The Gender Divide

Human Rights & Status of Older women in India


- India has a population of approx. 60 million older women (60+).
- Traditionally, in India women have a respectable place in almost all societies
- But ground realities vary from this fact and human rights of older women are at stake today

The Survey Finding




• 90% older women have virtually no knowledge of women rights, due to illiteracy or lack of exposure to outer world.

The Survey Finding



 Illiteracy the biggest cause of minimal understanding of human rights for the elderly

The Survey Finding



 44% older women were found living in inhuman conditions as per interviewers' observations.

Rights of older people

 Rights of older people are embedded in international human rights conventions

- Human rights of older people violated in a number of different ways...
 - Elder abuse
 - Mistreatment
 - Age discrimination
 - ageism

Older people need

- Equal protection before law
- Own property and use it the way they want to
- Information, knowledge and education
- Work and remain gainfully engaged
- Participate in the process of governance
- Social security emotionally, legally and financially
- Health and social care services
