This interactive discussion will discuss the usefulness of international human rights conventions in bringing about change at a grassroots level throughout the world. It will consider the impact of various treaties, such as the Convention on the Rights of the Child, Convention on the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women, Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination, and the most recent Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, in shaping and driving reform of domestic law, policy and practice. Treaty body monitoring processes and the Universal Periodic Review will be considered in terms of their effectiveness in bringing about change at a national level in order to respect, protect, and fulfill the human rights of all citizens. The purpose of this discussion will be to inform current efforts to strengthen human rights protection for older persons at an international level – through analyzing how human rights treaties can best be used to bring about real change in the lives of individuals.
