We place emphasis on supporting efforts to eradicate poverty, reversing the marginalization of Africa in the globalization process, and accelerating gender equality and women's empowerment. We believe cooperatives are instrumental to achieving these aspirations.

As the former UN Deputy Secretary-General Asha-Rose Migiro said at the launch of the International Year of Cooperatives, last year in October and I quote - "the cooperative movement balances both economic viability and social responsibility. They make enormous contributions not only to our members, but to their communities and societies. They empower youth, women, older persons, people with disabilities and indigenous peoples. Hence they serve as a significant social safety net".

- In both the developed and developing world, cooperatives contribute significantly to agriculture and rural development; and

• They present a huge opportunity for addressing gender inequalities and empowering women and men towards more equitable and resilient societies.

Ladies and Gentlemen

In recognition of the distinct contributions that cooperative enterprises can and do make to local and global development, the UN declared 2012 as the International Year of Cooperatives.

This Forum is very timely and is a component of the various activities undertaken through out the year to celebrate and promote the cooperative model and also promote capacity for cooperative enterprises. The forum aims to examine the strategic ways in which the cooperative model promotes individual and collective self-help, contributes to social-economic development and strengthens communities around the world.

Almost a year after the launch of the International Year of Cooperatives, it is worth revisiting the objectives, strategies and principles that underpin the development of the cooperative movement with a view to shaping forward-looking actions.
